Recommended courses for Advanced Standing in MSW: It is strongly recommended that students planning to apply for advanced standing in a graduate school for social work complete a foundational Statistics course and a Biology course covering human systems. These courses are not required for admission to the undergraduate SWK program. General Education Requirements

In addition to completing the courses required for the major, students must also complete the College of St. Scholastica's general education requirements referred to as Veritas. Religious Studies Course: No equivalencies available at WITC; can be completed at CSS.

Natural Science Pathways Course: Met with 10806198 Human Biology

History Pathways Course: No equivalencies available at WITC; can be completed at CSS.

Social Sciences Pathways Course: Met with 10809198 Introduction to Psychology or 10809159 Abnormal Psychology

Literature Pathways: No equivalencies available at WITC; can be completed at CSS.

Fine Arts Pathways Course: No equivalencies available at WITC; can be completed at CSS.

Philosophy Pathways Course: Met with 10520103 Ethics in Human Services

Open Pathways Course: Met with 10809172 Intro to Diversity Studies

Students may transfer in much of the coursework for Veritas, however, they must complete two Integrations courses at The College of St. Scholastica (CSS). Integrations courses are upper division courses that are intended to be writing intensive. SWK 3360 in the major will fulfill one of the Integrations course requirements. One additional Integrations course must be completed at CSS and the remaining general education requirements can be met with approved transfer courses.

This guide applies to the 2018-2019 academic year and is subject to the college catalog in effect at the time of admission to the College. Students admitted as first-year students at the Duluth Campus must also complete the Dignitas requirement.

The College of St. Scholastica's Department of Social Work has been accredited by the Council on Social Work Education since 1976. Graduates are prepared for beginning professional social work practice and state licensure.

- Students obtaining their Bachelor of Arts degree in Social Work at St. Scholastica are eligible for advanced academic standing in many graduate schools of social work within the U.S., which often reduces graduate school curriculum requirements to one year (Students seeking advanced standing in MSW program should complete a Human Biology and Statistics course as a part of the bachelor's program)

Requirements for Admission to the Social Work Major

- Recommended 64 -74 credits
- 2.5 cumulative GPA
- 2.5 cumulative GPA in psychology, sociology, and social work courses preferred.
- Minimum of a "C" grade in all prerequisite courses.
- Application to Social Work major and acceptance into the program.

Transferring to The College of St. Scholastica

The College of St. Scholastica accepts credits in transfer to satisfy major requirements as noted in this guide. Grades earned must be a C or better for transfer. To transfer credits an official transcript must be sent directly to CSS.

Career Opportunities

Social work graduates find work within child and family service agencies, hospitals and other healthcare facilities, community action agencies, schools, child and adult protection organizations, residential treatment programs, tribal social service agencies, gerontological service programs, mental health treatment centers, criminal justice settings, developmental and mental disability services and international social work organizations. Others go on to pursue graduate study.

St. Scholastica Graduation Requirements

- Minimum 128 semester credits earned
- Minimum 42 upper division credits (at or above the 3000 level) Last 32 credits taken at The College of St. Scholastica, Minimum 16 credits in the major
- Complete the requirements for general education and your major
- GPA of 2.5 in the Social Work major
- Maximum number of PED credits that can count toward graduation is 8
